

## What to Expect From Living in Brighton

We believe that Brighton has a lot to offer young people and can be a really interesting and happy place to live. There are many choices for community and support services, and different opportunities for employment, education, contact with diasporas and cultural provisions.

It is important that young people and the Local Authorities who look after them are aware that Brighton is a large town, with both the good sides and the difficulties that living in any city or large town has to offer.

If a young person wants or needs support to feel safe and make the most of the opportunities in Brighton, PTIUK can provide support and advice to help them with any difficulties that they might face in Brighton around accommodation, anti-social and offending behaviour, pollution and being able to access services.

For any young person thinking about a placement with PTIUK in Brighton, we will always discuss the placement area with them and carry out a full risk assessment based on their individual needs to make sure that this placement will be right for them.

Accommodation	<ul> <li>There are many positive move on choices in the private rented market for young people</li> <li>Private rental costs in the city can be very high for certain locations or quality of homes.</li> <li>Young people looked after by Brighton and Hove City Council, are often able to move on into council housing in the area</li> <li>However, young people looked after by other Local Authorities will not have access to the same opportunities</li> </ul>	We support young people to understand the housing options that are available to them, and to have realistic expectations of what kind of housing they can get. We support young people to look for work if they can work so that they can have a higher income to fund accommodation. We support young people to find suitable and safe accommodation.

Getting Around	<ul> <li>Brighton has a many buses and several train stations to get around the city. There are also good train connections from Brighton to London and other big cities on the South Coast. The cost of local transport is relatively cheap.</li> <li>There are many cycle lanes and areas with speed limits for young people on bicycles</li> </ul>	We will help young people to understand the local transport system and to access finance to buy transport cards. We will remain aware of any transport problems or strikes so that we can inform and support young people when there are problems.				
Education	<ul> <li>Brighton has a range of schools and colleges that offer ESOL and mainstream academic and vocational qualifications.</li> <li>There are also colleges and universities offering degrees and vocational training in many areas, and many adult education courses thata re accessible during the day or in the evening.</li> </ul>	PTIUK will support young people to plan for and access the education or training that they need. PTIUK keyworkers have good links with all the local colleges and the ESOL coordinators.				
Work and Money	<ul> <li>Young people who are over 18 may receive Universal Credit support from the government. There are sometimes delays or problems with setting up this support. This is a problem across the country.</li> <li>Brighton has good Advice, Information and Guidance provisions for debt management and loan sharking situations via YAC</li> <li>Brighton has fairly low unemployment and there are many jobs available. These jobs are often in the service and hospitality sectors.</li> </ul>	We have a good understanding of the Universal Credit system, and all keyworkers are trained and support so that they can work with young people to make sure that they get the financial support that they are entitled to. We will work with young people who are finding it hard to manage by providing advice about different support options. We will help people to understand their rights and to explore work options and to access work in areas that they are interested in, including putting them in touch with local youth employment services.				

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Your Community	<ul> <li>Brighton is a generally accessible place to live, although there are few multilingual services and miscommunication can create problems.</li> <li>There are many different community services for young people of different religions, including mosques, Hindu and Buddhist temples, and synagogues.</li> <li>Brighton is also a fairly diverse city and has groups and provisions to meet the cultural needs of many different cultures. It is also easy to get to London where a wider range of cultural groups can be found.</li> <li>Brighton has a many different youth groups including bespoke youth groups such as the PTI supported Global Social Club, the Brighton Youth Centre and Young Peoples Centre to meet the need of young people in the community. Most groups are good access community hubs and part of a larger youth participation strategy within Brighton - www.trustdevcom.org.uk/news/ the-brighton-hove-youth-collective/</li> <li>Brighton also has lots of different sports, entertainment and shopping options for young people.</li> </ul>	We will support young people to get to know the town and help them to access local groups and services. Our staff have good knowledge of what is available in the local community, and can help young people to find the facilities and groups that they need. We can support young people to plan trips and activities so that they stay safe and enjoy their experiences. We work with The Hummingbird Project to run the Global Social Club for young people aged 14-25 in Brighton on Mondays			

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Immigration Support	<ul> <li>Brighton has a range of legal and immigration services in the city which can help young people. These include Refugee Council, Refugee Radio, Voices In Excile, Migrant help and Hummingbird Project. The services offer a range of one-to-one legal support, drop-ins, group support and talking therapy.</li> </ul>	If a young person needs immigration advice or support, we will help them to make links with local services and support groups.			
Crime	<ul> <li>The crime rate in Brighton is average compared to other areas of the UK. The main crimes in Brighton are antisocial behaviour, violent crime and theft</li> <li>There are certain areas of Brighton where crime rates are higher. These areas are not near PTIUK properties.</li> </ul>	We will provide information and support to young people about risks so that they can keep themselves safe, including around risks such as hate crime and gang activity / county lines. PTIUK has a duty system to report concerns or events to staff 24/7, and staff cand provide Advice, Information and Guidance as needed			

## **Brighton Risk Assessment**

PTIUK looks carefully at all aspects of living in the Brighton Area, and we do regular risk assessments where we score the level of risk overall in this area. This leads to us giving the whole area a score **from 1 (no risk) to 25 (very high risk)**.
